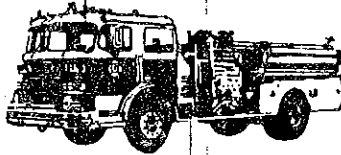

Gentlemen:

During the year 1979, the Mack Fire Department has continued its program of anticipating the potential growth of Green Township and equipping the Fire Department to handle this growth.

An aerial truck was ordered in mid-summer, with a delivery date due in the fall of 1980. This truck will assist the firemen in reaching our higher buildings and provide extra ladders for rescue purposes at fire scenes. The cost of this truck is \$255,000. A 1000 GPM pumper was ordered in November, delivery is due by February, 1980. This pumper will replace one of our older pumps, which sustained a major breakdown.

The passage of the new 2.3 mill fire tax levy, which will run for five years, will enable the Fire Department to accomplish many of its major goals, which had been set in prior years. By July 1, 1980, the Department will have hired its first full-time personnel, seven firemen and the Chief. These full-time personnel will help alleviate the manpower shortage during the critical daytime hours, the response time of our rescue units should be cut nearly in half during their work hours. Some of their other duties will include inspection work and other community services. Equipment replacement will remain a high priority, since the repair costs and unavailability of replacement parts for our older equipment continues to be a major factor affecting the budget.

The Mack Fire Department sincerely thanks the Trustees and residents of Green Township for their continued support as evidenced by the passage of the new tax levy. The MFD membership will continue its dedication to the protection of lives and property in Green Township.

TRAINING

New firemen completed the 36 hour T & I Basic Firefighting Course as required by State law. This course was taught by Chief Robert Weitzel, Deputy Chief Bert Frondorf and Lt. Bud Zorb. All other firemen are enrolled in the continuing education program in advanced firefighting as approved by the State of Ohio.

One member of the life squad, Arlene Zang, completed paramedic training. Three squad personnel, Dorothy Filbert, Diane Louden and Wayne Misch, entered paramedic training.

Twenty firemen and squad personnel participated in a day-long mock disaster (airplane crash), sponsored by the Delhi Fire Department.

Chief Weitzel completed a nine day Staff and Command Course at the University of Maryland.

Four firemen attended the Ohio State Fire School at Bowling Green State University. Jack Bohning and Tom Dietz completed Fire Inspectors Certification, Ed Thomas completed Heavy Rescue and Bill Fulton completed the course in Pumps. Chief Weitzel was an instructor in the Leadership and Command Course. The school is held over a five day period, totaling forty hours.

Lts. Bill Neu and Hal Welge attended the two day Greater Cincinnati Arson and Fire Investigators' Seminar. This is the first year of a five year program.

Chief Weitzel completed a fourteen hour class sponsored by the Ohio State Fire Marshal's Office on the Interpretation and Enforcement of the BOCA Code.

The 36 hour Fire Safety Inspector Certification Course at Scarlet Oaks was completed by Chief Weitzel, Lts. Steve Claytor, Steve Senft, Stan Rauh and Ed Fischer and Firemen Ed Thomas and Dwight Waldorf.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Numerous six hour CPR classes and nine hour CPR and Basic First Aid classes were taught by MFD Paramedics to Green Township business and school groups.

Lt. Bill Neu and Paramedic Karol Huber instructed employees of the European Health Spa.

Paramedic Robert Kallendorf instructed ten employees at Oak Hills High School. He also instructed thirty employees at Oakdale Elementary School, assisted by Lt. Ruth Ruberg and Paramedics Karol Huber and Arlene Zang.

Lts. Neu and Ruberg, and Paramedics Karol Huber and Iris Wasserman gave classes to employees at Hamilton Industries (9 hours).

Lt. Ruberg, assisted by Karol Huber, Arlene Zang and Iris Wasserman taught a six hour class to the Asbestos Workers.

Lt. Steve Claytor and Firemen Rick Dove and Ben Cafazzo gave a demonstration in the proper use of fire extinguishers to employees of Soabar Co. Lt. Shelby Loudon also participated.

Lt. Neu trained Soabar employees in the use of oxygen resuscitators.

Lt. Loudon conducted a fire drill and demonstrated the use of fire extinguishers to forty employees at Gold Circle.

A First Aid and Introduction to CPR class was given by Lt. Neu to the staff at the Resident Home for the Mentally Retarded. The class was designed to aid their personnel in emergency care of their children before arrival of MFD squad personnel.

A two hour demonstration of fire extinguishers and basic first aid was given for 38 Oak Hills School District employees. MFD personnel participating were Captains Roger Ruberg and Clarence Triplett, Lts. Steve Claytor, Shelby Loudon, Bill Neu and Ruth Ruberg and Fireman Mike Diehl.

Chief Robert Weitzel appeared on Channel 9 "Police Call" in a program dealing with "Winter Home Fire Safety" and "Woodburning Stove Safety".

Lt. Don Aisenbrey showed fire prevention films to students at St. Jude School.

Lt. Shelby Loudon gave a demonstration and showed a fire prevention film to 66 third grade pupils and their teachers at Oakdale Elementary School.

Lt. Neu demonstrated paramedic equipment and gave a short talk on first aid and the Fire Department to 30 Physiology students at Oak Hills High School.
